Born in Mexico City in 1977, Alejandro Almanza Pereda attended the University of Texas at El Paso, where he received a BFA in 2005. His approach to art-making surrealistically merges the absurd with the everyday to create warm, funny, yet sharp social critiques. Conceptually and physically athletic, Almanza's work pushes the physics of gravity to ply the territory of risk, safety, and security within differing cultural contexts.
