


# The HIDDEN Costs of War: Rape Culture Awareness and The Effects of Transitional Justice on Victims of Conflict-Related Sexual Violence

## **Abstract**

This independent study project examined the following research question: Does the robustness of transitional justice programs have an impact on the level and quality of redress for victims of conflict-related sexual violence (CRSV)?

The subsequent hypothesis crafted for this project reads as follows: The more robust a transitional justice program is in terms of countering rape culture, the higher the level and quality of victim redress will be. The methodology for this project includes a case selection process by which I



#### **Key Terms:**

- Conflict related sexual violence/CRSV: "rape, sexual slavery, forced prostitution, forced pregnancy, forced abortion, enforced sterilization, forced marriage and any other form of sexual violence of comparable gravity perpetrated against women, men, girls or boys within the context of ongoing war or conflict" (United Nations Peacekeeping)
- Transitional Justice: "the conception of justice associated with periods of political change, characterized by legal responses to confront the wrongdoings of repressive political regimes" (Rubli 2012, 4)
- Rape Culture: a social, political, economic, and governmental system that allows and continues the normalization of rape and sexual assault within a society (Gaskin 2020, 137)

## Research Design and Methodology

**Independent Variable Questions:** IV → robustness of transitional justice program [in accordance w/awareness of Rape Culture – whether Rape Culture is enforced or condemned] (Data schema)

- Prioritization level of victims' voices
- Validation level of victims' voices
- Whether perps or victims are stereotyped based on various demographical characteristics
- Whether there is a designated team w/in TRC for specific focus of combatting CRSV

#### **Dependent Variable Questions:** DV → level and quality of redress for victims of CRSV

- High/Medium/Low rating based on level of reported victim redress
- Data schema questions
  - What would be observed evidence of victims of CRSV who have gotten redress and healing?
  - In contrast, what would be the observed evidence of victims who have not received redress and experienced healing?

# **Findings**

### Summary

- Null hypothesis rejected that there is no impact on the robustness of transitional justice programs on CRSV victim redress
- Alternative hypothesis supported that there is a higher level and quality of victim redress found with transitional justice programs that are more robust
- Comparative case studies conclusion
  - Sierra Leone Medium
  - Liberia Low
- Overall, Sierra Leone saw higher levels of more concrete results in terms of victim redress due to higher levels of follow-up on policies, as well as higher reports of social integration and resilience mechanism
