

Methods

- 113 survey responses from College of Wooster students
- 3 interviews with Japanese students (from Wooster and another school)
- Individual and group interviews with 13 non-Japanese, American College of Wooster students

"She made it make sense"

- Interlocutors found Kondo's method to be surprising or unexpected
- Rationalization
- Association with Japanese culture
- Qualisigns of the book assert brand & aesthetic, while building trust



Kondo "stirred it up a bit"

- "white guy productivity minimalism"
- As a woman: calm, nuanced tidying approach
- As a Japanese person: cultural contrast



"If I had my life put together": committing to leveling up your life

- Shame associated with the inability to follow the KonMari Method
- Inaccessibility of the KonMari Method finances, time, effort
- Long-term commitment to an ideal lifestyle
- Gender expectations
